I began 2019 in Dublin at the Global Ireland Conference, exploring with our Ministers and other Irish Ambassadors and Consuls General the strategies that will allow us to deliver a doubling of Ireland's global footprint by 2025.

My favourite conference session, "Culture As a Bridge", saw major Irish cultural figures provide us with advice. One of these, Gary Hynes, brought "Waiting to Godot" to Charleston in 2017. Another, Paul Young of Cartoon Saloon, will be with us in Miami next week as part of an Animation Ireland delegation. We hope to see a third at a University near you before the end of March.

I next joined Ambassador Dan Mulhall for his first visit to Charlotte, NC, where he headlined the Allegro Foundation Charity Ball, spoke at UNC Charlotte on "A virtuous circle: Ireland, the EU & the U.S.", launched a campaign for an Irish Arts & Community Center and met Charlotte Mayor Vi Lyles and senior executives from American and Irish firms. John Young, our exceptional Honorary Consul in Charlotte, made the programme happen.

Preparations are well underway for St. Patrick's Day celebrations, which you can read about in our events section. We are delighted that David Stanton T.D, our Minister for Equality, Immigration and Integration, who is from beautiful Midleton in County Cork, will visit and lead our programme.



#### Irish News

Tánaiste and Minister for Foreign Affairs and Trade Simon Coveney T.D. delivered <u>his State of the Union Address</u> to the Institute of International and European Affairs in Dublin.

As part of Ireland's Brexit Contingency Action Plan, the Government published the next phase of its <u>Brexit</u> "No <u>Deal" legislative planning</u> in the event the UK fails to agree to a deal for their March 29 EU departure.

President Hiigins delivered the <u>keynote address at the Holocaust Memorial Day</u> commemoration. During the service, candles were lit for the Jewish victims of the Holocaust, and the names of Irish people who died in the genocide were read out.

On January 21<sup>st</sup> 100 years ago, the First Dáil addressed the international community and took Ireland's first steps on the international stage with the 'Message to the Free Nations of the World'.

Tánaiste Coveney announced the Government's <u>2019 St. Patrick's Day Programme</u> of international events, which will see the Taoiseach, Tánaiste, Ministers, Attorney General, Ceann Comhairle and Cathaoirleach promote Ireland and Irish interests around the world over the St Patrick's Day period.

The Tánaiste outlined the Government's 'Global Ireland' 2019 plans, the 'all-of-Government' programme launched in June 2018 which aims to double Ireland's impact in the world by 2025.

Minster for Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, Josepha Madigan T.D. opened the <u>inaugural Culture</u> <u>Ireland Global Ireland 2025 Conference</u> in Dublin Castle, bringing arts stakeholders together to engage on advancing Ireland's global reputation for creativity.

Minister for Agriculture, Food & the Marine, Michael Creed, announced Ireland's <u>Clean Oceans Initiative</u> which calls for all Irish trawlers to participate in a coordinated initiative to recover plastic and other marine waste from the oceans on every trip by December 2019.

The Government approved proposals for changes to the <u>Ireland / United States Preclearance Agreement</u> to allow for enhanced services at Dublin and Shannon Airports.

Dr. Seamus Dillon of the Waterford Institute of Technology is creating a repository of memories and experiences with, of and about spoken Irish in America that will be preserved for future generations and research. Congratulations to the University of North Carolina Tar Heels' <u>Irish sports team</u> which defeated Montana to claim 3<sup>rd</sup> place in their first National Hurling Championship.

#### Irish Couple Build Life in Atlanta, Raise Funds For Pediatric Cancer Research

The Leonards were a family of small business owners. Karen's grandparents, Christy and Catherine founded their farm supply, hardware and drapery shops along with a pub in Trim. Her father, Christum, opened Chris Leonard Hardware in the early 1950's also in Trim. Christum's siblings' businesses still dot the town, including a drapery, a pub, and a furniture store. Christum married Dubliner Norah McDowell in 1964.

Karen's father, Christum left a rich legacy of philanthropy, being involved in community charitable initiatives in Trim, from the Vintage and Veteran car show to the Meath Hospice Homecare movement. Hospice Homecare aimed to provide dignified home hospice experience for Meath residents, no matter location or finances and raised money and awareness to support the cause. Christum got involved after Norah's tragic diagnosis of breast cancer at age 38.

Karen earned a Bachelor's of European Studies at the University of Limerick and a Diploma in Human Resource Management from the Institute of Personnel Development.

A short drive away in North County Dublin, Jack Fleming and his wife Joy Kelly were settling down on their cattle farm. Jack grew up in Dublin City and Killarney, Co. Kerry. Jack's father was a cattle exporter. Before their marriage, Joy, from Ballycastle, Co. Antrim, had worked as a teacher, followed by a career at The Royal Bank. Joy's parents, William and Annie, taught in a small schoolhouse outside Ballycastle.

Donal studied Engineering at Dublin Institute of Technology and moved to Trim to work at NEC Semiconductors. Karen and Donal met while working at NEC Semiconductors in Ballivor, Co. Meath. Shortly after their marriage in 1994, they emigrated to Atlanta, and had their first child, Ciara (your author!). Rory came shortly after. Meanwhile Donal earned a Master of Engineering degree from North Carolina State University.



On a family trip to Ireland in 2001, they had to visit several physicians, seeking a diagnosis for the strange symptoms their daughter had been experiencing. During a stay at Temple Street Children's University Hospital, the doctors found a polyp, and they received a diagnosis of rhabdomyosarcoma, a rare form of childhood cancer after flying home to Atlanta. Ciara started treatment at the Aflac Cancer Center at Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, going through surgery and 48 weeks of chemo. Ciara was enrolled in a very successful clinical trial, which allowed her to finish her treatment cancer-free and with no late effects, both excellent outcomes. Ciara is currently a freshman at the University of Georgia, and Rory is a junior at Chamblee Charter High School.

Karen and Donal, wanted to help other families faced with a childhood cancer diagnosis and became involved with The St. Baldrick's Foundation. St. Baldrick's Volunteers called "Shavees" have their heads shaved in solidarity with children who lose theirs during harsh chemotherapy. Family, friends, and colleagues sponsor the sacrifice. Donal has shaved his head 16 times!

Funds raised go toward financing promising childhood cancers research. Over the years, events organized by Donal and Karen have raised 1.35 million dollars. Volunteers at their events have gone on to organize their own events in Atlanta, Tennessee and South Carolina.

Donal and Karen will spend their 25th Anniversary weekend in March organizing head shaving events in Fado in Buckhead and **ON** Peachtree St, before the 2019 Atlanta St. Patrick's parade steps off.
