Embassy outreach

As announced in our previous newsletter, we have launched our **Global Joycean Book Giveaway**. Editions of James Joyce's work were donated to the Irish Studies Department at Matej Bel University in Banská Bystrica. Unfortunately, the pandemic situation prevented us from visiting other establishments. We are very much looking forward to continuing this project next year as 2022 will mark the centenary of the first publication of "Ulysses".

After two years, we welcomed back talented Irish artist, Mrs. Margaret Anne Suggs. She returned to participate at the BIB - **Biennale of Illustration**





Bratislava, a regular international exhibition of original book illustrations for children and young people. While here, Margaret Anne held workshops for local elementary schools. The first of these was Hallowe'en themed. It was a great success, with the pupils embracing the Hallowe'en spirit and coming dressed up as witches, skeletons, ballerinas, zombies or cheerleaders. The children had a wonderful time drawing ghosts, spiders, bats and fellow witches.

The second school opted for a traditional Irish cup of tea inspired by the illustrator's latest book of the same name. The pupils very much enjoyed listening to Margaret Anne reading from her book. They then drew cups and ate cakes. Who would have thought that mugs could be so inspiring?

An **Irish room** will soon be part of the St. Vincent de Paul homeless shelter in Bratislava. The Embassy donated posters of Ireland to bring some colour and beauty to the shelter. An entire room will be decorated with these posters. Those staying at the shelter can look forward to appreciating the newly decorated surroundings in their "Irish room". ☺ We are pleased that our country's castles, cities, nature and culture will in some small way enhance their difficult lives. Ambassador's activities

Just four months since he arrived here, Ambassador Dermot McGauran continues to travel the length and breadth of Slovakia. An Ambassador must wear many hats. Dermot has already been a lecturer, an entertainer of small children, judge of Hallowe'en costumes, and a reader of poetry as well as working with those who seek to improve the lives of the local Roma communities. A keen linguist, he has been begun learning the Slovak language. In his spare time, Dermot has been enjoying Slovak rich culture and delicious cuisine.

Banská Bystrica in central Slovakia has been an Irish educational hub for some time. Thanks to their enthusiasm and close cooperation with Ireland's Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media, Matej Bel university run an **Irish studies** programme. It is therefore no surprise that the Ambassador's first educational visit took place there.



The Ambassador met with Mrs **Ingrid Brocková**, State secretary at the Ministry of Foreign and European Affairs responsible for economic diplomacy. Enhancing trade and the economic ties between Ireland and Slovakia were high on the agenda. The two also discussed the enormous contribution made by the Slovak community in Ireland and the Irish community here in fostering the very warm relationship between our two countries.

In October, Ambassador McGauran visited the **elementary school** on Javorová alej in Chorvátsky Grob where our own Slovak Shamrock Shane Crean teaches English. The Ambassador talked to the pupils about Ireland, St. Patrick's Day and Hallowe'en traditions as well as the Irish language. The pupils gave wonderful performances of Irish dancing as well as of hurling. The children were especially interested in learning more about the Irish origins of Hallowe'en and how these were brought by Irish



emigrants to the US in 19th century. They were, however, rather concerned about the welfare of fish in Chicago's river when the local Irish community dyes it green 😊



The Ambassador had a very warm and constructive meeting with the State Secretary at the Ministry of Foreign and European Affairs, Mr. **Martin Klus**. The two discussed the EU agenda and the many areas where Ireland and Slovakia can cooperate. State Secretary Klus is a proud son of Banská Bystrica and was pleased to hear of the Embassy's close relationship with his hometown.

This year's Halloween also marked a major development in air connectivity between Ireland and Slovakia. The **first flight from Košice to Dublin** took off from the capital of Eastern Slovakia on 31 October 2021 at 14:05. Ambassador McGauran was there to witness it. This new route, which will operate twice weekly, is enormously welcome. It is great news for the 30 plus Irish students studying veterinary medicine in Košice, as well as for those in our community living in the east. We are sure that the new route will provide a welcome boost for tourism, business and people-to-people links.

The Ambassador has also visited the National Council of the Slovak Republic. He paid an introductory call on the chair of the European Affairs Committee, Mrs **Vladimíra Marcinková**. They discussed bilateral relations between Ireland and Slovakia cooperation between our parliamentarians, the Protocol and Northern Ireland, social

the occasion. Ambassador McGauran read the 18th sonnet in John's celebrated English translation of this seminal work of Slovak poetry.

Following in the footsteps of his two predecessors, Ambassador McGauran is supporting this year's edition of the **Roma Spirit awards**. The competition presents the best practices and activities aimed at promoting social inclusion, supporting, and developing an open-minded community and mutual space for intercultural dialogue. The Ambassador served on the

international jury that evaluated 18 nominees in six categories and chose winners among personalities, municipalities, companies, NGOs, media and achievements in culture.



Each year, 25 November marks **International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women** and the beginning of the so-called 'Orange the world' campaign. This lasts just over two weeks until **The International Day of Human Right** on 10 December. The Embassy of Ireland is a proud supporter of the cause. The team took part in a series of photo shoots marking this important day.



Call on the community regarding Irish literature

In order to participate, we are looking for a recently translated book, one currently being translated or where a translation is planned or, indeed, for a book which is not yet being considered for the Slovak market. It should be something powerful and new that would draw the listeners to the book and motivate them to buy it!
